

Region under sieg

Towns north west of Bairnsdale were yesterday afternoon facing a direct threat from the approaching alpine bushfre as residents faced a nervous wait for a change in the weather.

At around 3pm yesterday Dargo, Waterford and Castleburn were braving for ember attacks, with the possibility of spot fires igniting in the region. The areas around Glenaladale, Wood-

The areas around Glenaladalo, Woodglen, Flaggy Creek, Bollomwaal, Seldom Seem, Depiford and Mount Taylor were also put on high alert.

Dargo's township assets were being protected with control lines, collar tanks and quick fills strategically located and generators located at major buildings.

Around 190 Country Fire Authority and Department of Sustainability and Environment fire fighters from the East Gippsland and Port Phillip regions were leading the assault with two slip on strike teams and one tanker strike team.

A fire over 41,000 hectares was raging within 10-15 kilometres of Dargo and was expected to reach the outer edge of the township by midfight. Incident controller at Bairnsdele, Dea-

Incident controller at Bairnsdale, Deanis Matthews, said Dargo had "bonkered down" as crews prepared for impending spot fires.

impending spot fires. Mr Mathews said the late arrival of increased winds had brought the area valuable time before the change. How-

ever, he indicated Dargo would experience its worst conditions once the south west wind change arrives, as the surrounding fires are blown noward the town.

Heavy smoke and orange skiws shrouded Bairnsdale yesterolay afternoon, however Mr Matthews said the town would not be heavily impacted and conditions were not as bad as previously artistrated last week.

"If we are locky, because the fire rows have started last week." "If we are locky, because the fire rows have started late in the day. Baimschle won't be heavily impacted. But we just have to wait and see what is happening with the turbulent situation that is about to be created (yesterday afternoon)." Around 400 GFA personnel had been

Around 400 GPA personnel had been spread north of Baimsdale to keep watch over private property. "The threat should ease substantially

by Monday. At that time if the change comes through -if it is a weak one - we have to immediately start back burning along the new eastern flank in the vicinity of the Mitchell River National Park," said Mr Matthews.

A 24-bour Relief and Registration Centre will operate at Baimsdale Racecourse until the bushfite emergency has passed.

Dargo was yesterday a town under attack.

Like an army anticipating an invading force, locals could only sit and wait through Saturday and yesterday's heat and cerie calm, ahead of predicted strengthening winds and a change some time this morning.

However, many expect the south west wind change that could save Gippsland towns further south could posh the flames back on to the township. Several outer metropoli-

tan Country Fire Authority (CFA) strike teams joined local crews in the town on Saturday afternoon, lining

the main street with tankers and personnel. There is the potential for the town to be cut off for several days, while several icons such as the school, hall, winery and pubs will be under immediate threat.

Department of Sustain-ability and Environment (DSE) staff have effectively invaded the township, but at the same time embraced the community.

Crows have closely monitored and worked on lines tored and worked on fines on the Mt Gynthia and Mt Darling blaze - affection-ately known as "My Dar-ling Cynthia", which spans over 40,000 hectares auth west of Dargo.

DSE was buoyed by the few hours of quiet weather gained by Sunday morn-ing, but said there was still a risk of the blaze joining up with the fire near Valencia Creek to the south.

A smaller spot fire was on Saturday positioned 12

kilometres away. "We've been preparing the township for what is likely to be a strong ember attack with the potential for several spot fires and for several spot mes and running fire coming though grass land," ex-plained DSE divisional commander, Rob Stewart.

"It is a community under siege. We are bracing ourselves for what is going to happen."





EARLY DAYS OF DARGO

When settlers first came to Dargo there were no roads or bridges and they used to come along the tops of the hills because there was not so much It was not agriculture which scrub and trees. brought settlers here. At one time there were only two settlers, then when gold was discovered crowds of men came, eager to try their luck in the There were a great number of new goldfields. miners working in the rivers flats and creeks in the district-many having claims.

When McMillan, the Pathfinder of Eastern Gippsland discovered Dargo, he took a "run" not long after for Mr. Foster. More came and took other "runs." In those days all provisions had to be brought from Port Albert on pack horses, many of the men walking and leading their pack horses, and everything was very dear. The old pioneers must have had a very hard struggle in those days.


When the quartz reefs were found on the hills at Grant a large town was built, and the people who lived on the flats at Dargo used to grow pro-

duce and sell it to the miners. The miners from all around used to bring gold and sell it to the storekeepers and to the Bank of Victoria at Grant. When the mines were worked-out a number of people settled on the land at Dargo and Crooked River.

There is now a good road to Stratford and we have a motor mail service to Dargo, which is a different way from what the old pioneers had of travelling. When my grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Traill came to the district more than 60 years ago they settled on the banks of the Mitchell river; there was no bridge there then. When the river was high everything had to be brought across in a boat.

I used to love to hear my dear grandma talking of the olden times. They have both gone to the country over the range.



DARGO.

Dargo, a little township, with a population of about two hundred, is situated amongst the hills 45 miles from Briagolong, the nearest railway station. The Dargo River flows through the town, and supplies fresh water to the residents. In the river many trout are set free annually, and in the fishing season many anglers visit the district. Oats, maize, potatoes, pumpkins, and marrows are grown, but, owing to the cost of cartage, these products are not sent to market, but are used as food for the animals,

which are after-wards driven away to be sold at the Melbourne markets. There is now a motor mail service where formerly we had only a pack horse. The car runs twice weekly. There are two churches, a general store, post office, school, hotel, and a mechanics' institute. The provisions are brought to the store from Briagolong in motor buses. In sum-

mer time many tourists visit the township. The scenery is very beautiful. Wild flowers and treeferns grow profusely, and willows and wattles flourish along the river banks.

DARGO.

Dargo, which is situated among the hills of North Gippsland, was discovered by the great path finder, Angus McMillan. When the settlers first came to Dargo, they had many hardships to endure. All the provisions had to be brought from Port Albert on pack horses, a journey of one hundred miles through rough bush and heavily timbered country. When the rivers were high all the loading and saddles had to be brought across in a boatswain's chair, and the horses were forced to swim.

It was gold which originally brought settlers here, and when this was discovered, many people of all nationalities and creeds came to seek their fortunes and join in the frantic scramble after wealth. When the gold gave out most of the miners left the district. Some of them selected land and grew produce for the miners. There are very few of the old pioneers left now. -M. KING, 13, Dargo.


The TV Management Group request for Volunteers/Helpers

His health began to deteriorate rapidly when well-intentioned but overbearing regulations were set in place. Reports of a 6-year-old boy charged with sexual harassment for kissing a classmate; teens suspended from school for using mouthwash after lunch; and a teacher fired for reprimanding an unruly student, only worsened his condition.

Common Sense lost ground when parents attacked teachers for doing the job that they themselves had failed to do in disciplining their unruly children.

It declined even further when schools were required to get parental consent to administer sun lotion or an aspirin to a student; but could not inform parents when a student became pregnant

and wanted to have an abortion.

RECIPE Blueberry Lemon Upside-Down Cake

Blueberry Topping

- 4 tablespoons <u>unsalted butter</u>
- □ 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 2 teaspoons <u>lemon zest</u>
- 1 tablespoon <u>fresh lemon juice</u>
- 2½ cups fresh blueberries

Lemon Cake

- □ 1½ cups <u>all-purpose flour</u>
- □ 1¹/₂ teaspoon <u>baking powder</u>
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- □ 1/2 cup <u>unsalted butter</u>, softened
- □ 1 cup granulated sugar
- 2 large eggs
- 1 tablespoon <u>lemon zest</u>
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- □ ½ teaspoon lemon extract





Instructions

Blueberry Topping

- Preheat the oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit. Spray the bottom and sides of a 9-inch round cake pan with non-stick cooking spray and set aside.
- In a small saucepan, add 4 tablespoons unsalted butter, ½ cup granulated sugar, 2 teaspoons lemon zest, and 1

tablespoon fresh lemon juice. Cook for about 2 minutes until the mixture starts to bubble.

- 3 Add in 2½ cups fresh blueberries and stir to combine.
- 4 Pour the blueberry mixture into the bottom of the prepared pan.

Lemon Cake

- In a medium-sized mixing bowl, whisk together 1½ cups all-purpose flour, 1½ teaspoon baking powder, and ½ teaspoon salt, then set aside.
- Beat together 1/2 cup unsalted butter, and 1 cup granulated sugar in a stand mixer or with an electric hand mixer. Beat together until fluffy, about 2 minutes.
- Add in the 2 large eggs one at a time, followed by 1 tablespoon lemon zest, 1 teaspoon vanilla extract, and ½ teaspoon lemon extract.
- 4 Add in the dry ingredients and continue to mix until combined.
- Spread the batter on top of the blueberry mixture.
- 6 Bake for 45-50 minutes or until the cake is firm to the touch.
- Det the cake rest for 10 minutes, and then carefully flip it over on a plate. Serve with fresh whipped cream on top!

Dargo Museum – Presented by Brian Madigan		
Brian started by thanking Rob Christie for donating a copy of his book to the Museum in exchange for a VHS video.		
Brian advised he is facing challenges in keeping the museum open for tourists. Due to time constraints and other commitments, he is sometimes unable to attend, and the museum cannot remain open to the public without supervision to safeguard the artifacts. Additionally, the museum committee has a limited number of members, with little interest from new participants. Brian expressed concern that the museum's closure would be unfortunate for the town, as it serves as a valuable historical site for visitors.		
Dargo CFA – Presented by Brian Madigan		
Brian reported the CFA has 2 new part time members. Brian is considering applying for a grant to fund the replacement of the ultralight.		
Brian finished by saying while there is no set date in place, it is looking like fire restrictions may be lifted soon. With this, a discussion was started around Daylight Savings ending next month and how it coincides		
with checking your smoke alarm batteries. Joan Traill asked Brian whether the CFA would be organising checks noting that CFA installed smoke alarms with 10year lithium-ion batteries to community members		

over 65 a number of years ago. Brian is not aware of any CFA initiatives at the moment. Emile Theodorou mentioned the CFA website states: 'Trained CFA Members can install smoke alarms in homes for people who cannot obtain, install or maintain smoke alarms themselves. This service is targeted, but some CFA Districts will also take community requests.
