

# CASTLEBURN

John Foster (1792-1875) was a pastoralist, merchant and member of parliament. He developed cattle and sheep properties in Gippsland, producing large numbers of fat stock for Victorian and Van Diemen's Land markets. One of the properties he owned or controlled was Castleburn in 1856.

Harry Louis Treasure (1877-1961), cattleman, was born on 20 July 1877 at Wandiligong, Victoria. When rabbits ravaged the bush pastures in the immediate vicinity, Treasure bought a property at Castleburn, south of Dargo, as the family's winter abode.


# Bark Huts at Castleburn

These two bark huts at Castleburn (below Dargo) were built by Harry Treasure and his family for workmen. In 1910 the country was totally over-run by rabbits, and there would have been at least a dozen men at any one time, trapping in the wintertime and poisoning in the summer. The small huts were built to accommodate the various workers.



# CASTLEBURN SCHOOL NO. 3308





(Referenced from "Vision and Realisation" - Victorian Education Department)

Castleburn is about 16 miles South of Dargo in East Gippsland and while gold brought pioneers to this area, rural pursuits hold those that remain.

A school was opened on the 21st, of February 1898 under the direction of Henry W. Gay. Not a great deal of information is available but when this school worked part-time with Glenaladale for a time, the teacher had to travel 25 miles between the schools on horseback on alternate weeks. When the teacher asked for an increased allowance to enable the purchase of good feed for his horse the Department refused to help

Children's Corner.

Castleburn, "Bulgoback," 2/9/04

Dear Aunt Patsy,—This is the first time 1 have written to you. I hope you will have room for another niece in the M.F.B. (Merry Ferry Boat)I go to a half-time State school. There are eight children attending it. I am ten years old, and in the fourth class.

The Catholic school is twelve miles from here. 1 have four sisters and five brothers. Their names are Kate, Mary, Dan, Pat, Julia, Tom, Peter, Dennie, and Lizzie. My little brother Dennie has been ill for a long time, he is now in the Bairnsdale Hospital, which is fifty miles from here. We all feel very lonely without him but trust he will be home shortly. I am staying with my aunties for a few days; they live about a mile from our home. Hoping to see my letter in the "Advocate,"



The Advocate was a weekly newspaper founded in <u>Melbourne</u>, <u>Victoria</u> in 1868 and published for the <u>Catholic Archdiocese</u> of <u>Melbourne</u> from 1919 to 1990.

The paper was founded in Melbourne in February 1868 as an outlet for Irish Catholic news and opinions. In March 1919 the paper was purchased from the Winter family by the Catholic Archdiocese of Melbourne and continued weekly publication until 1990.

# HOTEL at CASTLEBURN (Dargo Road)

This hotel was established by the Hardy family about 1864, between the current Castleburn houses and Peels Gap. When the road bypassed them, the licence lapsed in 1916. They then took over the Cobbannah Hotel, much further down the road towards Stratford, and operated that for many years. (It will come in a later post). The photograph by H.B. # For All Those Born Before 1945



We are survivors! Consider the changes we have witnessed. We were born before television, penicillin, polio shots, frozen foods, Xerox, plastic, contact lenses, frisbees and the pill. We were before radar, credit cards, split atoms, laser beams and ball-point pens. Before pantyhose, dishwashers, clothes dryers, electric blankets, air conditioners, drip-dry clothes...and before man walked on the moon.

We got married first and then lived together. How quaint can you be? In our time closets were for clothes, not for "coming out of". Bunnies were small rabbits and rabbits were not Volkswagens. Designer jeans were scheming girls named Jean and having a meaningful relationship meant getting along with our cousins.

We thought fast food was what you ate during Lent, and outer space was the back of the Outdoor Theatre. We were before house husbands, gay rights, computer dating, dual careers and computer marriages. We were before day-care centres, group therapy and suntan parlours. We never heard of FM radio, tape-decks, VCR's, electronic typewriters, artificial hearts, word-processors, yoghurt and guys wearing earrings. For us, time sharing meant togetherness...not computers or condominiums. A chip meant a piece of wood. Hardware meant hammers and nails and software wasn't even a word.

Back then "Made in Japan" meant junk and the term "making out" referred to how you did in your exam. Pizzas, McDonalds and instant coffees were unheard of.

In our days, GRASS was mowed, COKE was a cold drink and POT was something you cooked in. ROCK MUSIC was a grandma's lullaby and AIDS were helpers in the Principal's office. We were certainly not before the different sexes were discovered, but we were definately before unisex and "operations". We made to do with what we had. And we were the last generation that was naive enough to think you needed to have a husband to have a baby.

No wonder our kids don't understand us!!

(Ed Note - We tend to disagree with some of these claims but consider them interesting reading).

# Community Luncheon - Prostate Awareness



On Friday 12th September, we welcomed Moss Mahony and John Rodwell, along with their wives, to the Dargo Hotel for an important talk on Prostate Cancer Awareness.

Both Moss and John have been diagnosed with prostate cancer and are currently at different stages of their treatment journey. Despite the personal challenges they face, they are generously dedicating their time to raise awareness about the importance of early detection. They reminded us that a simple PSA blood test can often be the first step in identifying prostate cancer early, when treatment is most effective.

Prostate cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer in Australian men. Around one in six men will be diagnosed in their lifetime, and while it often develops slowly, in some cases it can be more aggressive. Regular check-ups, especially for men over 50—or earlier if there is a family history—are strongly recommended. Early detection not only improves treatment outcomes but can save lives.

We sincerely thank Moss and John for sharing their personal experiences with such honesty. While the conversation was at times raw and difficult, if their words encourage even one person to take action, it has been truly worthwhile.

A big thank you also goes to Helen and her wonderful team at the Dargo Hotel for providing such delicious meals and warm hospitality.





# DARGO & DISTRICT ANGLING CLUB UPDATE OPENING TROUT AND BASS FISHING COMPETITION RESULTS 25/26

Anglers were greeted by hugely different mornings to Open the Trout/Bass Season.

Frostyand very cold Saturday compared to a balmy Sunday. There was a good flow and colour in the rivers, so high expectations all round.

However, hard effort was the order of the day, as the fish did not want to join in, with many anglers not banking anything or just one or two for the weekend. No Bass were recorded and the majority of the 68 trout weighed in, were caught on garden worms.

A strong crowd of anglers, family and friends gathered at the Dargo River Inn for presentation day. Really pleasing to see serveral new members, plus some previously registered anglers, join in the this year, all of which adds to the Club stability.

**Dick Vance**, Committee Member, brought in two good trout, with one at 925gms, winning the title for **Heaviest Fish**. **Justin Sherritt** was pleased to pick up **Heaviest Bag**, with 6 fish to a total of 2.635kg. His only fish from the Wonnangatta at 819gms, tipped the scales in his favour.

Rex Blackmore placed an "unlucky" second with 4 fish at 2.253kg. Others who fared well, Chuck Norris 2.170kg, Alex Kidd (former 4 times Senior Champion) 2.075kg, (great to see Alex back!), and Toby Gibbs 1.923kg.

Total catch 26.183kg was an average 422gms, which is better than the previous Season.

Note - the average catch has now increased in each of the past 3 Season - a good sign for anglers. Also **Jack Gibbs** produced his two catches one of which was an 8kg carp, which won the **Garbage Fish** Prize...another "Mud Marlin" out of our system - well done Jack!

A new **Junior**, **Rex Hunter**, showed the way with his 614gm trout to win the **Junior Heaviest Fish** and was delighted in relating how he did it to Toby and Rex! **Olivia Simpson** won **Junior Heaviest Bag**, her 2 fish totalled 747gms. No Garbage Fish in Juniors. Great effort – stay involved!



# Cajun Rice and Sausage Skillet

This delicious Cajun Rice and Sausage Skillet has become an instant favorite in our house! It's easy to make in one pan with flavourful andouille sausage, veggies and rice with an incredible cajun seasoning blend. A complete meal on the table in just 30 minutes!

Prep Time: 10 minutes Cook Time: 20 minutes Total Time: 30 minutes Servings: 8 People

# **Ingredients**

14 ounce andouille sausage, cut into ¼ inch rounds

1 tablespoon cooking oil

1 red bell pepper, sliced

1 green bell pepper, sliced

½ yellow onion, diced

3 cloves garlic, minced

1 tablespoon Cajun Seasoning

10 ounce can diced tomatoes with green chilies

1 cup long grain white rice

1½ cups chicken broth

green onions sliced for garnish

### **Instructions**

- 1. Heat 1 tablespoon cooking oil in a large, deep skillet over medium-high heat. Add 14 ounce andouille sausage, in and saute for 3-5 minutes, mostly browning the sausage.
- 2. To the skillet, add the sliced 1 red bell pepper, 1 green bell pepper, and ½ yellow onion, and continue to saute everything for another 5 minutes. The vegetables should brown and become tender.
- 3. Add the minced 3 cloves garlic, and 1 tablespoon Cajun Seasoning and saute for another 1-2 minutes, just until the garlic becomes fragrant.
- 4. Add in 10 ounce can diced tomatoes with green chilies 1 cup long grain white rice, and  $1\frac{1}{2}$  cups chicken broth, and bring everything to a boil. Once the liquid is boiling, cover the skillet and reduce the heat to low, keeping the liquid at a low simmer.
- 5. Continue to simmer the liquid, covered for about 20 minutes. The rice should have absorbed all the liquid.
- 6. Remove the skillet from heat, keep it covered, and let it rest for another 5 minutes. Remove the lid and fluff the rice to redistribute all the vegetables and sausage throughout.

Serve fresh with sliced green onions, and enjoy!

Notes: This recipe calls for andouille sausage but you can use a kielbasa or other link sausage of your choice!



# Domestic Firewood Collection Area

Firewood collection seasons: 1 March to 30 June (inclusive)
1 September to 30 November (inclusive)

# Firewood Collection Rules

Only collect firewood from within a designated domestic firewood collection area and during a domestic firewood season.

Only collect fallen or felled trees.

Do not collect more than 2m3 per person per day. Note: 1m3 is approximately a 1.8m (6') x 1.2m (4') trailer of split firewood neatly stacked to a height of 0.5m (20").

Do not collect more than 16m3 per household per financial year.

It is illegal to sell firewood collected from domestic collection areas or to use the wood in a commercial enterprise.

Heavy vehicles (> 4.5 tonne GVM) (including any trailer) must not be brought into or used in a domestic firewood collection area.

Heavy machinery (e.g. a bulldozer, crane, excavator, forwarder, hydraulic log splitter, saw bench, skidder, skid steer loader and tractor) must not be brought into or used in a firewood collection area.

Do not tow or winch fallen or felled trees along the ground.

Do not collect firewood within 20m of a watercourse.

Do not drive your vehicle off formed roads or tracks.

Do not cut, break off or damage standing trees or shrubs (living or dead).

Do not take away fallen or felled trees that are visibly hollow or growing moss or fungi with a coverage of >50%.

Do not damage, disturb or destroy native flora and fauna.

Do not injure, damage, deface, desecrate, destroy or remove cultural heritage sites and artefacts.

Take all litter with you when you leave.

Do not enter the forest on days of Code Red Fire Danger rating.

Do not use chainsaws on days of Total Fire Ban.

Use only chainsaws fitted with a proper exhaust and spark arrester.

Only refill chainsaw oil and fuel on an impermeable surface.

# Safety

Please <u>take care of yourself and others at all times</u> when collecting firewood. In particular:

- · Avoid collecting firewood when conditions are wet, windy or hot
- · Assess your work area for hazards before you start work
- Avoid working near hazards
- · Avoid working alone or with children
- Be trained and competent in the use of firewood collection equipment (including chainsaws) and use well maintained equipment
- Wear appropriate safety clothing and equipment

Hazards found in designated firewood collection areas may include, but are not limited to:

- · broken overhead branches, dead standing trees
- · uneven or slippery ground conditions
- vehicles
- mine shafts
- snakes and stinging insects.



Video surveillance cameras may be installed in this firewood collection area.


