**Description** This large two-storey Victorian house is one of Sale's grandest examples of its type. Built as the Presbyterian Manse, the house uses polychromatic brickwork to good effect, with cream brick quoins, string courses and eaves detailing, and black-washed bricks also as string courses. The two-storey verandah has some sections of cast iron valence remaining.

A large mature pin oak in the front garden is an important garden element. The majority of the garden is not visible.

Condition & Integrity: Externally substantially intact, with the major apparent change being the loss of some verandah elements. In 2004, sections of the material covering the verandah balustrade has been removed and it appears that substantial sections of the verandah are intact, or have been successfully reconstructed. Not inspected internally.

**History** Section 5, Allotment 9 was 2 acres reserved for the Presbyterian Church in 1870.(1) The first Presbyterian Minister of Sale, Reverend W. Login, had built his own home on the eastern outskirts of Sale, so when he retired, it was necessary to build a manse for the new minister. The manse was built in 1886, and ready for B. M. Connor when he arrived in Sale in 1887. (2)

Further research into the history and location of the first manse is desirable.

**Statement of significance** The Presbyterian Manse, Sale is of local historic and aesthetic significance to Wellington Shire. Historically, it is a significant part of the heritage of Sale for its association with the Presbyterian Church and its clergy, important community members. An imposing Victorian building, it is of design importance as a rare example of a double storey residence in the Italianate style, with features of interest including the polychrome brickwork and remains of cast iron valence.
