Description It has a high M-hip roof with a concave roof verandah, stuccoed brick walls and cast-iron finished brackets to the timber capitals of the verandah posts (Butler 1982:19).

The house is said to possess cavity wall construction both internally and externally on stone foundations (5). It may have been designed by the architect, George Hastings, who was responsible for designing most of the substantial buildings in the area during the 1880's - 90's. (Refer 50) (Butler 1982:19).

History Early land owner; Nathaniel Ford.

During the late 1850s, John Orr sold these allotments to the Tarraville butcher, Nathaniel Ford (1). The land remained vacant until after Ford's death when his widow, now Elizabeth Cauley, sold it to Port Albert storekeeper, Frederick C. Shaw: this was in 1885, for 16 pounds 15 shillings. (2). By 1891, Shaw had constructed this house (3) only to die, at Alberton, four years later (4).
