**Description** Location : Complex located on the corner of York Street and Macalister Street. The former 1891 Mechanics Institute fronts York Street as does the 1944 building which was the second Boys Technical School.

The first Boys Technical School of 1926 fronts onto Macalister Street. (RNE 100606).

There are three buildings of heritage significance on the present site of Macalister Secondary College, two built for Sale Technical School and the third being the former MechanicsÕ Institute in York Street, which accommodated the Technical School from an early date. The MechanicsÕ Institute was built facing York Street, Sale, in 1891 and was occupied by the School of Mines, Art and Technology. This is now owned by the Macalister Secondary College and forms part of the Macalister Secondary College group. The first Technical School building, built in 1926, faces Macalister Street and is typical of similar buildings throughout Victoria. It is a single storey building of square horseshoe plan. A porch entrance of Art Deco design is asymmetrically positioned. The lower walls and quoins are red brick. The upper walls are finished with stucco render and frame multi-paned casement windows. Rafters are exposed in the eaves for decorative effect and the roof is terracotta tiled. The later building, built in 1944, which faces York Street is also red brick but two storey and of distinctly modern design. Designed as a series of interlocking cubic forms, the main classroom section has two continuous bands of fenestration high-lighted by concrete sills and lintels. At the corner closest to the street, a rendered stairwell section is painted and features another corner window and flagpole. There are several other buildings on the site, towards the southern and western boundaries, which are not considered to be of architectural interest. (RNE 100606).

Condition and Integrity : Both the 1926 and the 1944 buildings are remarkably intact when viewed from the street and appear to be in excellent condition. As at 1997 (RNE 100606)

History The tender of Alex Davidson was accepted for the erection of the Mechanics' Institute in December 1889.(2) Completed in 1891 and replacing the old Mechanics' Hall in Foster Street(3), this building was used as a Mechanics Institute and Public Library. It has a long history of accomodating civic functions and a range of Sale schools such as the Sale School of Mines and Technology, later Sale Technical School, and the Sale Agricultural High School from 1907 to 1916.(4) The Institute is now part of the Macalister Secondary College complex and is now named after James Coverdale, a former Mayor of Sale.

Statement of signific	<b>cance</b> The former Mechanics' Institute is a significant part of the heritage of Sale as evidence of an important phase of the development of educational services in Sale. The building's design and location symbolise the importance of this institution in the early development of the town. Features of architectural interest include the flamboyant buttresses and gargoyles and represent a comparatively high degree of embellishment for a Sale building. Cultural sentiment is probably attached to the building for its importance as a place of community educational activity over many years, demonstrating a continuity into the present through its association with Macalister Secondary College today.(A.4, F.1, G.1)
